What will you learn?

From this course you will get an introduction and overview of a variety of aspects of European Theatre. Inevitably, the course also focuses on related elements including history, literature and art. In this semester we are seeing two plays with a strong background of classical music. In attending performances on a regular basis you should begin to develop a lively response to a variety of styles, format and theatre spaces. You will acquire a vocabulary of informed critical responses to what you see. Above all, you will find theatre enjoyable! Though don't expect to like everything equally. What you learn from this course will be direct proportion to the effort and energy you put into it!

Assignments and Grading

There is no fixed reading for this course. Frequently you will be given or referred to materials that you will be expected to read and discuss. Prior to many theatre visits you will be given a questionnaire which must be completed and handed in by the time and date indicated.

At the end of the semester there will be a final examination consisting of short answers to 30 questions and a short verbal report on a subject to be arranged through discussion with RDD.

Notes

- You are expected to attend every class. Serious illness or emergency are the only acceptable excuses for lateness or absence.
- Theatre visits and cultural excursions (including day trips) are part of the course and therefore mandatory.
- Participation is a crucial element of all classes. It is expected that you will actively contribute during every class session. It is a requirement that every member of the class is respectful of the opinion of their classmates.

Theatre Etiquette:

Basic rules of good behaviour and politeness apply:

- Be in your assigned seats at least five minutes before the performance begins; most British theatres do not admit latecomers.
- Do not fidget, even if the play is deadly, absolutely no talking or whispering during the performance
- Make certain your mobile phone is turned off (not on silent). The bright LED light is as great an irritation as sound to fellow audience members
- No chewing, eating or drinking of any kind during performance
- Be sure to go to the lavatory BEFORE the performance (and/or during any interval). Once the lights go down, it is most disruptive and rude to leave your seat.
- Do not take large bags or backpacks to any theatre as many do not have a cloakroom

You'll be pleased to know:

There is no dress code – Just clean and tidy.

And don't forget: the theatre demands a lively and attentive audience – it is not like TV!

In the intervals [intermissions] you are expected to leave your seat and explore the theatre space, not consult your phone, etc!
